A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

My dear brothers and sisters in our Lord Jesus Christ,

If you are reading this **before 3:00 PM** on Sunday, December 24, may these last hours of the Advent season be a quiet time of special blessings for you and your family. If you are reading this **after 3:00 PM** on Sunday, December 24, a blessed Christmastide to you and to your family!

Since this is the bulletin for the Fourth Sunday of Advent, let’s reflect briefly on the readings for this final Sunday and final day of Advent!

Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word. With these words, our Blessed Mother places her total trust in God. Aren’t we called to do the same? Mary’s response to God is the same response we too should offer to the Lord. But do we really understand that this took much more trust in the Lord than we might imagine? Mary agreed to motherhood as an unmarried woman – this would have been seen as sinfully aberrant at the time, so much so Mary could have been stoned and killed for fornication or adultery. Are we willing to trust so much in the Lord that it could potentially lead to our death?

There are similarities between the Lord’s work in Mary and His work in all of us. Jesus lives within each of us spiritually. Jesus lived in Mary spiritually as well as physically in her womb. Jesus was made physically visible to the world through Mary, but He should also be made visible to the world through us as well. Who we are and how we relate to and treat each other is a sign to the world of who Jesus is and who we should be as His followers. Are we, through our words and actions, showing the world what it means to be a disciple of the Lord Jesus? Is there a better time than this to do so? The late great entertainer and comedian, Bob Hope (1903-2003), who spent many Christmases away from home performing for the military serving overseas, once said, “My idea of Christmas, whether old-fashioned or modern, is very simple: loving others. Come to think of it, why do we have to wait for Christmas to do that?”

Even though most have probably already made Christmas plans, like last year, we are encouraging the following:

- If possible, come to Christmas Mass at midnight or on Christmas morning. Our Christmas Eve Masses are very full – inside and outside! If we can continue to “spread the crowd” out better among all our Christmas Mass times, it will certainly be a better Christmas experience here for everyone! Thanks to all who have already made these efforts in the past – it shows and is appreciated!
- For those who must come to the 3:00 PM Masses (in the church and gym) on Christmas Eve, let’s “fill the gym first” and “park closest to the gym first” even if coming to the Mass in church. This allows guests, visitors and latecomers the opportunity to park closer and get into the building more easily for worship. Let’s make “room in the inn” for those who do not join us weekly so that their experience may be so good that they may choose to come back more frequently.
- And on Christmas (indeed year-round!), “one family, one car.” Fewer cars in our parking lot at any time is certainly a good thing!

Our Eucharistic Holy Hour this week is a Holy Hour for Life and falls on the Feast of the Holy Innocents – the real first martyrs of our Church. Certainly abortion remains the most tragic and horrific respect life issue we need to fight – the right to life is the most basic and the first among all others rights. The Holy Innocents also remind us that other respect life issues are important, too. Babies should always be born and never be aborted! When babies are born, we need to do all we can to form a world where families can raise their children in safety and security. That is why health care, poverty, immigration and abuse (among many, many others) are also important respect life issues. Join us this Thursday for our Holy Hour for Life as we pray that the dignity and sacredness of every human life from conception to natural death be preserved and respected.

That’s it for now – God bless one and all!

WORSHIP & SACRAMENTS

AND THE WORD BECAME FLESH



Among the many aspects of Advent liturgies (purple, the wreath, light, etc.), perhaps the most important is a focus on the Word. We prepare eagerly to hear, during the Mass of Christmas Day, the beginning of the gospel according to John: “In the beginning was the Word...and the Word became flesh...” One of the greatest achievements of the Second Vatican Council’s liturgical reform – and one of the hallmarks of the new translation of the *Roman Missal* - was its decree that “the treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly, so that a richer share in God’s word” may take place at Mass. (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, #51) During Advent, we are called to celebrate this Word, the Christ, who dwells in our hearts. Take time to prepare for Mass by reading the scriptures and reflecting upon their meaning in your life. At Mass, truly be open to the Word that is proclaimed – a Word that is living and effective, truly Christ speaking to His Church!

Communal Celebration of the

Anointing of the Sick

Saturday, December 30, 2017 – 4:30 PM Mass

At times of sickness and declining health, the Church offers the beautiful sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick to her members. Post-Vatican II theology stresses strongly that this sacrament is a sacrament of the living, i.e. it *should never be delayed* until death is possibly imminent as was the common practice for many centuries.

Who may be sacramentally anointed? Church law is very specific so that this sacrament is celebrated appropriately and not indiscriminately. The following may request to be anointed:

Those suffering from a serious illness (either physical or emotional)

Those who are elderly and have become notably weakened due to their age

Those hospitalized due to illness or have upcoming surgery



IMPORTANT REMINDERS: *For those who wish to be anointed, please arrive by 4:15 PM and get a nametag in the gathering space. Greeters will then escort you to your seats in the front middle pews of church.*


The sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a sign of the Lord’s care and the Church’s concern for her sick or weakened members. It reaffirms the human dignity of all people and is not only a sign of life in the Church but also the continuation of the healing ministry of Christ Jesus Himself.

We will normally celebrate the Anointing of the Sick communally at the 4:30 PM Mass whenever there is a fifth Saturday. Upon request, we can also celebrate the sacrament during any weekday Mass and anytime outside of Mass including in homes, hospitals, and other health care or retirement facilities.

EVANGELIZATION & CATECHESIS

GOSPEL FOR ALL AGES

Luke 1:26-38

This Sunday we read the story of the angel Gabriel's announcement to Mary about the birth of Jesus. This story is found ONLY in Luke's gospel. On this fourth Sunday of Advent, the liturgy shifts our attention from John the Baptist to Mary, the mother of Jesus. Both John and Mary serve as important figures for our reflection during the season of Advent; they both played instrumental roles in preparing the way for Jesus.

One of the challenges of faith is to recognize God's plan for us and to remain open to God's will and God's actions in our world. Filled with God's grace, Mary models for us the kind of faith that is needed to cooperate in God's plan of salvation. Like Mary, we are given the awesome opportunity to cooperate in God's saving plan. On this final Sunday of Advent, our Gospel invites us to consider how our preparations for Christmas have made us more aware of God's grace working in our lives.

Family Time

Gather together your family and talk about what you have been doing as a family to prepare for Christmas. How have these preparations helped you to better celebrate the central mystery of Christmas, the Incarnation? Our gospel today talks about how Mary was prepared for her role in Christ's birth. Read today's gospel, Luke 1:26-38. Consider the question: What enabled Mary to say yes to God? Which of your Advent activities have made you more aware of God's grace in your life? Conclude in prayer together that God's grace will enable your family to be more faithful and obedient to God. Pray together the Magnificat.
