PLANNING AREA A: FACILITIES

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Facilities Planning Area is to provide, manage and maintain the growth of our parish, a facility for all members and groups of our Catholic community that is, economically and functionally practical, environmentally safe, physically attractive and spiritually rewarding.

Challenges:

A-1 How can we increase external on-site garage storage space?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Identify ministries who need space.
- 2. Identify space needs funding from ministries, parish and individuals.

Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Reorganize the existing space. Assess needs and look at future expansion with committee.
- 2. Extend the garage and build an off-site garage.
- 3. Add bays or a second story to the garage.
- 4. Utilize space in lower level of rectory.
- 5. Establish an organization plan for assigned spaces.
- 6. Add shelving in the old sanctuary located in Fr. Porter gym.
- 7. Contact Justin Auer (parishioner) regarding storage addition.
- 8. Build more storage and designate for certain items.

A-2 How can we create a continued facility expansion plan to accommodate the growing community?

- a. Long-range: land acquisition, parking, access, facilities
- Short-range: Ice machine, refrigerator, kitchen facilities, carpeting, and painting

 Identify planning committee for short and long-term expansion needs of the parish, as well as establishing a financial plan for needs.

Convocation Solutions:

- Identify root causes of current space issues.
- 2. Investigate with Liberty Township, Lakota School District to identify 10-year growth projection.
- 3. Create a permanent facilities committee.
- 4. Utilize property on east side.
- 5. Hire a maintenance/repair committee.
- 6. Improve/update kitchen.
- 7. Prioritize needs.
- 8. Hire a consultant to provide a utilization review of space.
- 9. Add a second story above classroom area.
- 10. Use off-site locations.
- 11. Create an area on time and talent form for facilities volunteers.

A-3 How can we enhance the worship space?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Identify ways to enhance worship areas (i.e., stained glass windows, Station of the Cross, etc.).
- 2. Acquire estimates and funds to complete projects (i.e., landscaping, outdoor fixtures such as benches, etc.).

- Sound system, window tinting, brighten up wall behind altar some type of large screen to allow parishioners to witness baptisms.
- 2. Provide a cry room area with walls (current area too small).
- 3. Place a statue of Mary in front.
- 4. Mural on chapel wall
- Catholic Church should look like a Catholic church.
- 6. Add art in the chapel and more stained glass in the church.
- 7. Create meditation areas around campus.
- 8. Provide more lighting on the altar.
- 9. Bring back the bells.

PLANNING AREA B: MINISTRIES

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Ministries Planning Area is to provide a sense of community and fellowship to serve the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of all parishioners. Communicate the scope of ministry activities to involve, energize and excite our parishioners, active and inactive. Encourage the growth of lay ministries to compensate for the reduced number of clergy while emulating the proven framework of larger parishes around the country.

Challenges:

B-1 How do we structure our ministries to meet the challenges of a mega parish with 5000+ families?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Investigate how other parishes of this size are structured.
- 2. Determine administrative roles and responsibilities of parish priests that can be delegated to laity.
- 3. Facilitate the sharing of ministries between parishes.
- 4. Determine if we require additional ministries to meet a wide range of parishioner needs, and if any existing ministries should be eliminated that are deemed less effective.

- 1. Improve communication of all ministries through web site, ministry fairs and personal invitation.
- Promote laity involvement in leadership.
- 3. Promote and encourage training and workshops.
- 4. Education campaign highlighting parish needs
- 5. Know where the parish need is and the magnitude of the need.
- 6. Integrate ministries with other parishes.
- There is a need for more deacons.
- 8. Network with other parishes.
- 9. Pray for vocations.
- 10. Have priests/seminarians/nuns speak to RFC and youth group.
- 11. Establish an organizational chart with job descriptions indicating ministry leaders' responsibilities.
- 12. Provide a paid ministry leader position with ministry heads having expanded, identified responsibilities.
- 13. Continue with ministry fair every six months.

- 14. Increase involvement.
- 15. Subdivide into smaller groups.
- 16. Recruit and promote new leaders.
- 17. Mentor/partner with new parishioners.
- 18. Planned leadership rotation (term limits)
- 19. New organizational structure tiered
- 20. Network across ministries.
- 21. Follow-up on time and talent input.
- 22. Involve more people in running and sustaining the ministries.
- 23. Evangelize from the pulpit.
- 24. Make people feel welcomed.

B-2 How do we establish a St. Vincent DePaul Society within our parish to fulfill the needs of those less fortunate?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Find a "champion" to lead the formation.
- 2. Consult with SVDP for guidance.

Convocation Solutions:

- Communicate the desire and solicit leadership through personal invitation at Mass, St. Vincent DePaul staff, web site and bulletin.
- 2. Make the phone call.
- 3. Have someone educate us.
- 4. Form a start-up team.
- 5. Recruit a leader or organizer.
- 6. Provide a "store front."
- 7. Investigate "how to."
- 8. Advertise in bulletin/Modern Saint.
- 9. Have Father Terry give testimonials.
- 10. Avoid conflict with Reach Out Lakota.
- 11. Start a St. Vincent "conference."

B-3 How do we provide for the special social, emotional and spiritual needs of single adults, young and old?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

1. Survey parishioners with experience on this type of program with other parishes. Survey other parishes as needed.

- 2. Establish a singles ministry and recruit a volunteer leader. This leader would "report" to a parish staff member.
- 3. Have the singles ministry seek out new members through personal invitations and organize activities.

- Communicate the desire and solicit leadership to identify successful programs inside and outside the Catholic community, i.e. area colleges and local churches.
- 2. Provide invitations to ministries.
- 3. Start a "singles" ministry.
- 4. Offer something for college kids in summer.
- 5. Provide an occasional Mass for singles.
- 6. Offer more social activities.
- 7. Investigate social justice organization that would appeal to young adults, "Cyber Café" communication
- 8. Organize mission trips.
- 9. Survey single adults to determine needs and follow up with random interviews.
- 10. Consolidate with St. John's and St. Susanna's to boost numbers.
- 11. Overcome fear.
- 12. Find ways to invite the disabled to be part of groups.
- 13. Do not exclude the married from young adults group.
- 14. Start a ministry for support/counseling (with training)

PLANNING AREA C: SPIRITUALITY

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Spirituality Planning Area, rooted in the Eucharist under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, is to help find ways to enable, encourage, educate, enliven and enhance our communal spirituality through personal growth, thus providing a firm basis for evangelization.

Challenges:

C-1 How can we breakdown barriers of indifference and fears?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Send out personal invitations by a trained person who is warm and enthusiastic.
- 2. Reestablish the network of care or small group network.
- 3. Establish a spiritual buddy program.
- 4. Welcome and acknowledge people.
- 5. Bring in revival speakers.

- 8. Catechesis during Mass
- 9. Examine youth of Protestant churches and learn how they generate fun.
- 10. Educate through ministry fair (more than once per year).
- 11. Bring young families into the involvement of the parish.
- 12. Be a welcoming parish,
- 13. Move people together in church during Mass.
- 14. Personal invitation
- Catechism refresher
- 16. Revitalize CRHP.

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Celebrate spirituality as a whole.

- 3. Get endorsements of parish priests and leaders.

- 1. Provide education to eliminate fears.
- 2. Need organization to support time and talent.
- 3. More involvement in groups
- 4. Don't try to blend groups into one.
- 5. Provide education to understand alternative forms of Catholic spirituality/traditions.
- Provide contact names for different ministries.
- 7. Showcase a different ministry at the end of each Mass.
- 8. We are too structured and some do not feel welcome.

C-3 How do we encourage others in the parish to be spiritually connected by participating in the activities of the parish that enhance spiritual growth?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Establish an information network or communication system.

- 3. Establish a simple communal prayer for Mass and other gatherings a unified prayer.

- 1. Provide personal invitations to social events.
- 2. Open prayer services to families, i.e. Confirmation sessions
- 3. "Little blue books" and other tools

- 5. Provide more structured interaction between ministry groups to bring them together.
- 6. Have dinner for all new parishioners each month and provide with a mentor family.
- 7. Provide a bulletin board with pictures of new families.

- 9. Organize an off-site family picnic.
- 10. Be open to trying new things.
- 11. Have a youth guitar Mass and youth dinner once a month.
- 12. Open the office on Sunday for people who have questions.
- 13. Provide personal testimonies at the end of announcements.
- 14. Organize fundraisers with food (fish fries, spaghetti dinners, etc.).
- 15. Provide educational brochures for teens.
- 16. Solicit input from each age group.

- 17. Reinstitute the Book of the Month.
- 18. Provide services and events "traditional" to the church.
- 19. Explain time and talent packages personally over the phone.
- 20. Increase follow-up on offers to join ministries.
- 21. Organize children's activities at the same time (youth babysitting).
- 22. Rotate days/time to prevent constant schedule conflict.
- 23. "Fr. Terry's corner" in the bulletin with stories
- 24. Provide more opportunities for Eucharistic adoration.
- 25. Read parish prayer at every Mass.
- 26. Encourage "bring a friend" to feel more comfortable.
- 27. No pressure from groups for commitment
- 28. Call and visit new families.
- 29. Help understand the value of knowing more families personally.
- 30. Provide an incentive to read the bulletin or put it online.

C-4 How do we educate our people about our faith?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Reestablish and promote adult formation.
- 2. Establish a small group program that caters to specific needs and topics (i.e., tithing, marian prayer, saint history, social justice, etc.).
- Communicate or publish educational programs outside of the parish.
- 4. Recruit speakers on educational topics.

- Provide handouts once a month/week.

PLANNING AREA D: EDUCATION

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Education Planning Area is to strive to create quality faith formation programs that inspire and encourage continuous life-long learning through teaching, training and support of volunteers, as well as supporting Catholic elementary and secondary education.

Challenges:

D-1 How can we obtain or enable off-site locations for RFC and pre-school programs that meet both Parish and Archdiocesan requirements?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Investigate public schools, Mother Teresa, modular units
- 2. Work with facilities PT
- 3. Moveable walls in Parish Center
- 4. Expand physical facilities (i.e., second story classroom area).

- Keep it here, not off-site.
- 2. Trailers
- 3. Rent space for RFC from schools/ Mother Teresa.
- 4. Offer pre-school during 4:30 and noon Mass.
- 5. Use the gym or church for class space.
- 6. Use people's homes.
- 7. Use Lakota schools.
- 8. Prioritize utilization of space.
- 9. Collaborate with other parishes on classes and activities.
- 10. Check with AOC on guidelines to use private homes, especially for Confirmation and older students.
- 11. Ensure St. Maximilian groups space needs are met before outside groups.

D-2 How can we improve the overall RFC program; curriculum content and materials, teacher recruitment, education and retention, and parental involvement?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- Work with new Director of Faith Formation on all program aspects.
- 2. Form curriculum committee to study all pre-approved materials available and determine those that best meet St. Max requirements.
- 3. Support volunteers in all amenities so as to facilitate their recruitment, participation, and retention.
- 4. Mandate educational requirements for teachers and provide opportunities to obtain them.
- 5. Actively recruit teachers that want to provide a service beyond the support of their own children enrolled in the program.

- Provide childcare with activities for teachers' children.

D-3 How can we provide religious education for post-confirmation students and collegians?

 - ▲ Utilize guest speakers/teachers with appropriate expertise (i.e., high school religion teachers) provide stipend
 - ▲ Dovetail this theology with existing social youth group program.
 - 2. Continue and expand existing youth group retreats program.
 - 3. Establish community service programs for high school students.
 - Better utilize experienced and capable high school students to mentor peers on faith/theology topics.

<u>College</u>

- 1. Establish parish Neumann Clubs.
- 2. Establish parish Theology-On-Tap program
 - ▲ Invited (engaging) speakers

PLANNING AREA E: OUTREACH

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Outreach Planning Area is to answer our call to help those in need within the St. Maximilian family, our local community and the world in general. We strive to involve parishioners of St. Maximilian and neighboring faith communities in sharing their time, talent and treasure.

Challenges:

E-1 How do we involve more parishioners in sharing time, talent and treasure?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Send out letters to make personal contact.
- 2. Provide motivational speakers to speak at Mass.
- 3. Place bulletin boards in centrally located areas.
- 4. Send out bulletin announcements.
- 5. Invite charitable organizations we support to discuss and share experiences, i.e., coffee and donuts after Mass, or evening sessions.

I-1 How do we create an environment that encourages people to actively participate in Mass?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 10. Less performance from musicians so more people can join in.
- 11. Teach that Mass is for active participation by all.
- 12. People like songs during daily Mass.
- 13. Continue to meet people sitting around you before the start of Mass.
- 14. Gentle reminders from priests

- 15. Provide missellettes.
- 16. Survey what people think it means to actively participate in Mass.
- 17. High energy from the celebrant.
- 18. On-line question and answer with pastor.
- 19. Children's Mass
- 20. Parishioner invitation to pastor for dinner
- 21. Sermons need to be more dynamic.
- Too many distractions.
- 23. Invite different ways to worship.

I-2 Our music is for the glory and praise of God. How can the music enhance the liturgy?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

- 1. Conduct a parish-wide music survey.
- 2. Explain to parishioners what is liturgically correct.
- 3. Establish a music committee.

- 1. Choirs should be part of Mass participation.
- 2. Provide live, more suitable music.
- 3. Improve the music.

- 17. Provide music, at times, without accompaniment.

- 18. Provide certain types of music at certain Masses for people to choose to go to the Mass they prefer.
- 19. Integrate the church music ministry with the rest of the congregation.
- 20. Many different songs and too many verses at Communion.

I-3 How can we have the full congregation hear the spoken and sung word with an inadequate sound system?

Pre-Convocation Solutions:

1. Invest to correct the problem.

- 1. Provide better training for sound board personnel.

- 3. Misselettes need to be available regardless of sound system.
- 4. Fix it!
- 5. Continue to provide songbooks.
